The Safety Minute...

I know you all look forward to these little missives from the Safety Weasel, and I really don't want to disappoint. Today's subject is rule 209, printed below just so you don't have to scramble to find your rule book:

209. A train stopped other than at a station or within yard limits must send out a flagman with a red flag or light that can be seen by an approaching train for a distance of at least 100 feet.

This really is self-explanatory, but we've all seen the rule not being used - a poor unfortunate derails the engine of the train, and after the initial OMG moment, gets off, and stares at it like he's never seen anything like it before and begins to mentally bemoan his fate. The interesting thing is the BRAKEMAN comes up to the engine and stares in the same fashion at the now grounded steam behemoth. Wrong move on the part of the Brakeman. His job is to protect the end of the now stopped train, which means he needs to go back and flag down anyone approaching. I KNOW we are all keeping the 100 spacing between trains (yeah, that's in the rules as well). Once the following train is stopped, it may approach the stopped train, but then the duties of rear end protection falls to the brakeman of the

second train, and it daisy chains along until the entire railroad is sitting behind the poor unfortunate soul who derailed in the first place. Also keep this in mind, the Brakeman of the first train, once the following train is stopped, is more than welcome to go up to the derailed engine and stare in wonder...but only after he has done his job protecting the end of his train.
