Mainline track inspection and alignment work was conducted by Dan Williams and Pat O'Guinn. Rails was replaced on Summit curve going to Big Pine along with a replacement rail installed on Creighton Cut-off due to a mower driving over the rail bending the rail.

Back in the compound, members cleaned up the facility, the parking lot was sprayed for weeds.

Master Switch Builder Richard Ronne was cutting tie material for a new switch. SMP-Project Manager Dave Bunts welded a storage rack for the new tie material that we purchased from the O'Guinn Family Business at a greatly reduced price.

The Roadmaster got the blower car out on the mainline, cleaned & blew off leaves and grass three quarters of the mainline before car truck problems caused the unit to go out of service.



Fortunately, Car Repair Foreman Brook Adams was working on a rider gondola in the compound so with the help of Compound Foreman Bob Roberts and the work truck we could deliver the blower car directly to the Rip Track for the CRF to inspect.

Speaking of inspections, if you discover a club car that needs attention from the CRF, please fill out the red tag, wire tie the red tag to the car and place the car on the floor tracks in Noble Quick Building so the car does not return to service before inspection and repair. It does no good to report a car needing service verbally to the OS or the CRF. Red Tags are in the Noble Quick Building near the light switches.

Signal Maintainer Bill Hesse and helper Mel Hitchcock was out working on the Flasher crossing signal and Wig Wag signal. Assistant SMP Larry Jongerius worked on the Hunter and did a boiler wash.

Safety Update!!

Hi Y'all - it's your favorite safety inspector here again

The biggest issue that I have seen with our bi-weekly run days is folks who believe that the wide open track that they see in front of them is carte-blanche to pull the throttle back into the tender and feel the wind blow their hair back...



Au contraire mon ami.

The speed limits at RLS are fairly straight forward:

Yard Limits (which include the Hunter Station trackage): Walking speed, with the ability to stop quickly

Mainline: The speed should be no faster than is safe, or in the curves the speed must be no more than that in which you can STOP (not slow down, actually stop) in half the distance that you can see. The worst areas for visibility are Palm Garden and the curve going INTO Allen's Valley under the bridge when running Westbound. Keeps these places in mind.

Please be aware that not all stopped trains send out flagmen (a subject for another note later) and as the engineer you may find yourself running up on a stopped train and finding yourself dragging your feet, pulling back on the cab and praying to the steam gods that you don't smack into the poor bugger who is stopped ahead of you looking back in horror.

We all need to keep in mind that nasty movie from the 50's "Speed Kills", or if you're from the 60's, the same thing applies, but it was a different thing that they were talking about.
