# The Safety Minute...

Howdy folks, it's the Safety Weasel yet again.

Today's little missive is Rule 211 subsections a. AND b. Rule 211 (I know that all of you have the rules memorized and know exactly what I'm talking about) is basically in existence to prevent one of us from running head on into somebody else because Rule 211b says that main line switches shall be placed back into the direction of travel for the day. Please note that that does not necessarily mean the switch is realigned for the main line. We have multiple routes we can use for running, and some of those use the diverging route through the switch to make the diverging route the main line for the day. Most of our switches are locked into the route we are using that day. (If you don't have a switch key, pick one up in the clubhouse on your way out, there are a bunch of them. Also, if you're a bit anal-retentive, the key is a Master lock key number 2001, you can get your own and not worry about other peoples germs on the general use switch keys.) On your first trip around our miniature rail system, look at



the switches and how they're set. If you need to unlock one of them to make a turning movement, reset the switch back into the locked position. Oh, and the subsection a of Rule 211 says that it is the responsibility of BOTH crew members to make sure Rule 211 b is followed. This sorta keeps the finger-pointing down...Both are responsible.
