Larry Jongerius had done a bunch of homework, so we let him run with the purchase orders and cash. (It turns out he really is honest, he is still around and not living on beach in Mexico on our dime.) Any way, he got the steel ordered, and he and John Gurwell went to pick it up and deliver it to RLS on a Saturday. We organized a small work party to see how far we could get in starting to weld the supports into the shape of what they needed to be, and after a couple of hours of work by Larry, John, Bob Roberts, Brook Adams and Scott Horgan the entire quantity, all 28 of them, were fully assembled. They still need to have the weld cleaned up a bit from the flux, and coated with a surface protectant so the steel doesn't start to corrode as soon as we put them into the concrete, BUT the big news is we have started. There is still a bunch of work to go, but the progress is visible. And as Confucius said, the longest journey begins with a single step. Anyway, I would like to thank the membership of RLS for another great year. As I've pointed out time and time again, it is NOT the board of directors that makes the place run as well as it does, it is the membership. All of you have seen a need to have something done, and just gone ahead and pitched in with your support to make

whatever was needed happen. Thank you all for that. I guess it's why I keep coming around – it's the people, not just the trains, that makes RLS one of the best places to hang out on this earth.

After that project, Richard designed a gauge measuring device that can be rolled along the track to check track gauge. Now that the cooler winter months are upon us work will be starting on the escape track behind Noble Quick building to allow quick access to Allen's Valley and David's Yard area. This project will involve some extra work days in the months ahead. As work progresses work day notices will be posted.
