Mark your calendars to join us on Saturday October 14th for our next schedule Fun (Work) Day at the Riverside Live Steamers.


The Safety Minute...

Today's safety minute isn't going to mention one rule. Not one. Today's little missive is about situational awareness. Fighter pilots know that one needs to be aware of the world around them during battle, it's too easy to get laser focus on what is right in front of us and ignore what's going on around, and in that case, it's too easy to get killed by something that you didn't even realize was there.

In our hobby we have to do two things at the same time, we get to be both fireman and engineer. In the full size trains, the fireman worries about the water and the fire and boiler pressure and the engineer worries about the safe operation of his train and the timetable. (I know - there are small industrial steam engines with a one man [woman/individual person/gender non-specific person, fit in which ever you like, I really don't want to offend anyone as I write this. But that may change after I send it, who knows?] cab, but I'm not here to argue crew size in the prototype.)

We had a couple of incidents of near crashes last run day, the folks involved know who they are, and both of them were the result of having their heads down and not being aware of the world around them. We ALL need to pay attention to the world on the rails. Kids, dogs, balls from the playground, other trains (haven't seen a zombie yet, but this IS California after all) are all out there, and we are responsible to make sure we don't run them over. We can write all the rules in the world, but it boils down to the engineer and crew of the train to make sure we are safe. Pay attention out there, just looking around is the best start to being safe ever.



Mewtwo Visits RLS
