June work days are the best since the overcast skies do not clear before 11 AM allowing for cool working conditions at RLS. Saturday June 15th was no exception!

With a small track gang of 7 RLS members, the new AV#13 switch was installed before the sun broke through. Master Switch builder Richard Ronne continues to turn out great standard switches for easy installation in the field. AV#13 had a very worn out frog which you could see wheel sets bounce over the frog during

train operations. Now both ends of the south fuel leads have new access switches in place.

Water Master Bob Roberts installed a new set of valves for the Panorama Point siding. Bob discovered that John Noble had built the first valve set to last with extra concrete, rebar and a foot print that would support a full-size water tank!

Due to an idiot driver, driving over the engine leads off Columbia Avenue we installed several new ties on the south engine lead tie wall. We also installed a gate latch to prevent the south gate from swinging over the engine lead. Please use the yellow painted latch on the gate with opening and closing.

NIGHT RUN July 6th






There is no public passenger service on these events.




From the Compound Supervisor....

For those of you that read your email you know that the Compound was closed again this month. The closure left half the compound unavailable during a run day as well. What you may not know is the why behind the closures. Well I am about to let you know about the "RLS Steaming Bay Archaeological Expedition Team."

Many boring facts all came together that prompted the

need to get the electrical conduit installed between Barny's Barn and the Noble-Quick building. So, a few of us came out and formed the above mentioned "team." (BTW if you like the name, thank the club secretary) On day one 6 feet of trench was opened and 3 feet was completed to the depth of 3 feet. Not very impressive! On day 2 the trench was opened and completed to the required depth for 24 feet. Getting much better at this!



now you are probably thinking that this is just a repetitious job of stabbing a shovel in the ground and lifting some dirt out. Oh, contraire! We had a variety of tools in use. There were 5 different shovels, a hoe, a scraper, and

a jack hammer with 3 different attachments. Plus assorted protective equipment.

On day 3 we rested. I bet you didn't expect that! On day 4 the trench was opened the full length of 60+ feet and completed to depth for about 47 feet. The dig on this day was not ordinary at all. More than once we had to use the jack hammer to break up large pieces of asphalt that were buried over 20 inches down. It was also used to break the surface using the spade bit. The top few inch-

es of ground are like digging through concrete. Note that we did presoak the ground...

On day 5 we completed the trench to depth the full length. NO small feat! If you think about it most full length shovels are only 5 feet long. So to dig 3 feet deep you are on your knees doing this work. So! Now that the trench is complete we get to start the easy work. You cannot just lay the conduit on the dirt and call it a day. We started hauling backfill sand to the trench and laying a bed for the conduit. We put the conduit in the ground on top of the sand. Then we started hauling more sand to completely cover and protect the conduit. We then dropped a warning tape on top of the sand and scrapped in some dirt to hold it in place and called it a day.

Day 6 we played with trains!!

On day 7 we came back and backfilled the rest of the trench and removed the excess dirt. The rest is for the next generation to 'dig up.'
