

March 27th 1938 the Atchison Topeka and Santa Fe Railroad started the "San Diegan" along the Surf Line from Los Angles to San Diego.



Along The Tracks

The new schedule for Workdays and Board Meeting has proved successful.

Members arrived in the morning to work on various maintenance projects both on the mainline and in the compound.

Work completed in the morning session 8:00 AM-10:30 AM consisted of the following projects: Work on transfer table track to eliminate the binding of the table; wiring conduit installed in Storage Container #1 for overhead lights; work on additional steam bay electrical plugs; out on the mainline replacing switch ID numbers that had faded; cross leveled from SS#1 switch to 70 feet east of the Big Pine Tree; removed dirt at VC#2 switch for proper draining; replaced batteries in weather head on engine house roof for proper operation.

Wrapping up all projects by 10:30 for the Board Meeting at 11 AM. The highlight of the Board Meeting was Past President Dave Bunts handing out COVID-19 Support Awards to those members who continued to maintain the facilities, improve the security and re-wire the entire compound for better electrical service. The following members went over and above duty to support RLS during the pandemic closure: Steve Borcher, John Gurwell, Brook Adams, Tom Lebs, Bob Roberts, Tiffany Love, Chris Neiman, Randy Chase, Jonathan Chase.

After the awards ceremony (since we cannot hold annual dinners during pandemic) the Board meeting was handled by President Pat O'Guinn. Normal department reports were given. The major project list was tabled at this time since we are not allowed to start any

large projects. As the year progresses the Board will determine when it is possible to take on a large major project. Routine maintenance and repairs will continue per normal practice. Meeting adjourned at 12:10 PM.

Once COVID-19 restrictions are lifted we will return to our normal schedule of Workday 8AM-Noon, lunch to the workers at Noon and Board Meeting at 1:00PM that is listed in our By-Laws. This adjustment to the start times are temporary changes only due to COVID-19 restrictions. Plan now to join us on the March 20, 2021 Workday and Board Meeting starting at 8:00 AM for the Workday and 11:00 AM for Board meeting. All RLS members are welcome to attend the board meeting.

Its Not Always Dry

Any of us that have lived in Southern California for years or have railroad books about Southern California floods most likely will remember stories about the floods of 1938.

During that winter rain season of 1938, it was the 100-year flood that cause millions of dollars in damage to all railroads, all highways and many of the bridges coming into or out of Los Angeles to be destroyed. Millions more have been spent since that time to prevent flooding with storm drains and concrete riverbeds.

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RLS had a scale version of that flood in January 1993. Several days of rain completely filled the old lake East of Allen's Valley.

Prior to the park remodeling, the drain for the lake was the overpass bridge into Allen's Valley continuing to the neighbor's property to west of RLS.

These photos show the amount of water that completely covered the mainline and Allen's Valley. The drain in Allen's Valley was under the raised track of the 1" engine lead that was mounted on full size rail that we now use as parking bumpers in the compound!

R.L.S. 2020 Club Awards

As with everything else related to the COVID-19 pandemic our normal annual Club awards presentation has changed for this year. Generally we gather to honor the Live Steamer of the Year, Hogger of the year as well as awards for support of the Club and the Railroad. As we were shut down for passenger service for nine months of 2020 the Board of Directors decided to honor those members that continued to come out and support the club during the lock-down.

Some of the tasks that have been accomplished are as follows:

- The electrical service to the compound and three buildings has been upgraded.
- The Bunts By-Pass ties have been replaced.
- A storage container was re-positioned and braced on its concrete pad.
- Fences patched after being cut by vandals.
- Fences were upgraded on the west side with cut resistant materials.
- New lock hasps were designed, fabricated, and installed on the storage containers and most gates.
- New locks were purchased and re-keyed to go on the new lock hasps and Nobel-Quick doors.
- New fixtures and dispensers installed
- Continued maintenance on David's Yard and Allen's Valley switches.
- General cleanup of the compound and Bab's And a whole lot more.
