


With a Brakeman's class coming up in August I thought we would review RULE 224.

The major project of the day was to install the second switch for the new Vandenberg Crossover and connecting track. We had installed the first switch on the February 15, 2020, workday, with the remaining switch and trackage was to be installed at the March 14, 2020, workday. On March 13, 2020, the world came to a stop with the COVID-19 Pandemic closures of all activities.

Bill Hesse and Tom Lebs also worked on the Panorama Point Shelter and Benches for the replacements from wood to metal.



If you don't see the liner, look in the bottom and see if it just fell down and please pull it back up. If there is not liner in the barrel use the next closest one or go and get a liner. A little help from each one of you will be a great help to me when cleaning the compound.

Recycling, it saves the club money. We pay CRV for every bottle of water or soda we buy for your consumption. We are back running public trains after a 17 month delay due to the pandemic!

SMP Dave Bunts fired up the Hunter and Sean Hagen brought his new 2-8-0 out for the two public trains. Unfortunately, the Hunter developed a steam delivery line problem upon reaching Allen's Valley to get her train.

Quick meeting of the minds in the AV, had OS Casford turn over operational control of the railroad to the SMP. Casford them proceeded to steam up his Santa Fe #2926 to replace the Hunter locomotive in passenger service.

While #2926 was building steam, Sean Hagen started public service. This was a soft opening for RLS to remember how to run passenger trains!! We did not announce that we were open for the day with a 10 AM – 2PM running times.

With the #2926 and Sean's engine we handle 130 passengers. Just like riding a bike, it all came back to us on how to work passengers and freight trains.

Engines under steam were Sean Hagen 2-8-0, Richard Ronne 4-6-2, Steve Borcher 2-6-0, Rich Casford 4-8-4, Chuck Kennemer Vertical engine.

We had lots of help setting up and brakeman for the public trains. Plan now to join us on August 8th for our next public run day.

The railroad always has something going on, here's a project update:

Twelve years ago a new seating area was installed at Hunter Hobby Park.



This was Panoramic Siding Station built by Nickolas Radosevich, 13, as part of his Eagle Scout Leadership project.



Time, weather, irrigation and the elements have taken their toll.





Tom Lebs and Bill Hesse have embarked on a project to replace the seats with something a little more durable and less maintenance for the Parks Department.



Tom has started welding up steel expanded metal benches. These new benches will be powder coated and will match the design of benches used throughout the park.

Bob Smith's Fairmont 19A Railcar

In early February 2020, I [and Luke Amrein whom some of you know] was called to his bedside in which he asked if we could remove his Fairmont 19A Railcar from the garage. The Fairmont was found under a great pile of clutter and railroad collectibles. Luke and I spent 3 hours digging out the railcar and locating the missing pieces.

A couple of days later, Tom Lebs provided the expertise to load such a large heavy object onto a flatbed trailer using the electric winch. All of the loose parts were piled into the pickup truck bed and hauled 9 miles to my Oak Hills home in which I had 2-1/2 acres to place the project. Over the course of 2 weeks the side walls, rear wall, roof, door frames, doors and rebuilt chassis were fastened together with many bolt holes to be drilled and/or reamed. Tom came to the rescue with a large supply of bolts of the appropriate size to facilitate reassembly.



Bob had acquired many new parts needed for a complete rebuild of his railcar: Onan engine, transmission, fuel tank, seats, door frames, doors, hinges, wheels, brakes, underframe, side view mirrors, brake lights, custom paint job and cast aluminum roof corner brackets. In order to place a For Sale listing on the North American Railcar Operator's Association website: www.narcoa.org., I was required to become a member.

For the listing several photos were taken of the completed project minus the electrical wiring, engine controls, rubber window moldings, door latches. Several months went by before a serious offer was received in July of 2020. With Janet's permission the railcar was sold at the agreed price and cash handed over.

The railcar is now in Jackson, California and running on the Amador Central Railroad mainline which is a historical logging railroad. For those who would like to see Bob's railcar in operation please visit: https://youtu.be/MfEIjUARfdI
