of action in which an outcome was not anticipated.

It was the summer of 1997; my son Chris and I attended a Cub Scout camporee. These events included games, camping, and an evening campfire. At this camporee campfire there was a ceremony to retire the America Flag. The MC of the event asked the audience for anyone who was in the military and had been in combat to take part in the ceremony. Another individual and I stepped up and were included in the ceremony. When I returned to my seat, Chris looked up to me and said "Dad, were you in a war?" "Yes", I said. He later asked me a lot of questions about my experience; but one that caused a change for the both of us, was "did you get any metals?". "I don't know" I said.

When I was discharged after my tour in Vietnam, in April 1970, the controversy about the America's involvement was very negative. My experience was something I wanted to put behind me. I just wanted to get on with my life and forget the negative experiences. So, I gave away almost everything I had that would remind me that I was a soldier. If it wasn't for my Mom, I would not have had any mementos of my military service.

Chris and I found my DD214 (that's a document you receive upon discharge that summarizes your military service) and on it was a description of some of the citations I earned. I had no idea what any of the words meant. We learned that you could make a request to get the awards. We filled out the required paperwork, mailed it and in a month or so, a large package arrived in the mail. We opened the package, took out several little boxes that contained ribbons of the awards I earned along with an explanation of what I had done to earn them.

I put them back in the package and put it away and forgot about them.

Six years later, Chris earned his Boy Scout Eagle award. His Mom and I were so proud of his accomplishment that we later had his Eagle Badge and his citation framed. When we showed it to him and placed it on the fireplace mantel, he went into to his room and brought out a wooden frame with all my metals on display (see the photo) and said, "Thanks Dad for your service."



I still get a little teary whenever I remember that moment.

What was the unintended consequence of that gift? For the first time in over 33 years, I was proud that I had honorably served my country.

So, what has this to do with being a member of the Riverside Live Steamers? We got involved with this hobby because of our fascination with steam locomotives. We wanted to experience the sound, the power and all the moving parts of these machines. We admire all the work that goes into building and maintaining these machines. But there is an unintended consequence of our participation in this hobby. Every time we run our locomotives; we bring a smile to the public who watches us. You can see the joy and happiness of people we had never met. And sometimes we bring back a wonderful memory to someone who is old enough to have experienced a time when steam locomotives were a part of everyday life.

The next time you are out on our run days, take a moment to observe the public, see their smiles and know that it is a gift you are giving to them for your unintended consequence of being a part of Riverside Live Steamers.

The skyrocketing cost of petroleum products, especially the diesel fuel that California mandates. has strained our personal budgets, and it has definitely affected how much diesel fuel is in the storage tank at RLS.

RLS has in the last couple of running years (not the calendar Covid Years) has been forced to purchase more fuel than the stipend provides for the yearly operation of trains. We are now in the unenviable position of having to ask oil burning engineers not in the business of pulling the public to remember the yellow box under the phone in the clubhouse that says "Fuel Donations". If one actually considers the coal burning folks having to find coal on their own, and the propane fired folks bringing their own full propane bottles to play trains, it does seem to make it a bit more equitable – we ALL get to share the pain of buying that burning *something* we use to make steam.

So, those of you burning the refined, liquid portion of dead dinosaurs, please throw some of those fine American greenbacks into the fuel box at the end of the day. It will help RLS stay as active as we are in the capital improvement areas.

Even with the threat of 105 degree temps for Sunday from the National weather service earlier in the week, there were more general public in the park Sunday than in the last couple of run days.




It did reach 96 degrees around 2:00pm and the station shut down at 2:30pm due to a lack of passengers.

The August calendar photo is of the Los Angeles & Salt Lake Railroad concrete bridge over the Santa Ana River in Riverside CA (absorbed into the Union Pacific in 1921).

The bridge was built in 1904 and spans 985 feet. It is still in use today as the U.P. has a yard on the South end of the bridge.
