

A couple of members have asked "Where did the Roadmaster go?

Some of you will remember last year I took a job as an Extra Board Brakeman on the Cumbres & Toltec Scenic Railroad running out of Chama, New Mexico. With the pandemic still causing shortage of operating personnel last year the Railroad asked me to get qualified to cover days off for regular crews.

This year the Railroad management asked me to take on new position of Risk Officer for the Railroad and develop a Risk Management Department. The new position covers Safety Risk, Reputational Risk, Environmental Risk and Financial Risks.

It has grown into an interesting level of involvement with regulatory agencies, suppliers, staff training and financial studies on train operations.

During the train summer season, most of the departments of the railroad are in operation 7 days a week. The general shortage of workers around the country have not forgotten Chama, NM or Antonito, CO as the railroad and local businesses struggle to find help to keep their businesses open.

2022 Fall Meet


Here's an item to ponder:


Tom Lawson conducted an interesting experiment on his Berkshire recently. Some background: Tom's boiler was originally built with 48, ½" ID steel tubes. The smokebox paint that he used held up fine through years of service. When he found it necessary to re-tube his boiler, he went with 30, ¾" ID copper tubes, which resulted in about 20% less heating surface. Although the boiler still steamed very well, as a result of less heat transfer to the water, the smokebox ran hotter and the smokebox paint did not hold up. So a discussion ensued among a small group, Tom, Berkshire builder Gene Lurwig, and others, at the Blueberry meet last September about what non-invasive mods might be tried to decrease the smokebox temperature. The group came up with the thought of trying to decrease the speed of the gases through the tubes by "softening" the exhaust.

So Tom did the following: A 3-1/2" extension of the exhaust nozzle was made which made the exhaust steam exit inside the petticoat pipe. Keeping the blower on at all times was necessary to fill the stack. The exhaust nozzle bore is 7/16".

My first thought was that the exhaust might sound kind of soft or mushy, but that was not the case. The exhaust still sounded fine, and from what Tom was able to measure, there was a noticeable decrease of the smokebox temperature. So the implication might be that the exhaust gases did indeed slow down. The boiler still made adequate steam. Now I'm thinking, what if we had the original heating surface with the $\frac{1}{2}$ " ID tubes and softened the exhaust using this method? We might never be able to get the safeties to re-seat – ha!?!

One other very noticeable characteristic was that the oil burner became less susceptible to being "sucked out" with large throttle changes without having to adjust the atomizer and/or the oil valve. This would indeed imply that the exhaust was "softened". *- Jim Kreider*
