From the Compound Supervisor

As many of you know our main building has been around for a while. At the time of construction, the standard was to primarily use galvanized pipe for water. If you have lived in a house that has this type of plumbing you know that it eventually has to be replaced. That time has come for our old pipes.



At the last Board meeting I was put in charge of getting the plumbing replaced. The job is not overly complicated or difficult. It just takes some time and proper preparation. The month of June for me is not going to have much of the precious commodity we know as time. I am planning on collecting materials and starting the plumbing change out in August. Here is where we get to the preparation part.

Before I can get the plumbing done several tasks need to be accomplished. The drywall in the restroom near the kitchen needs to be removed from the ceiling and the West and East walls. In the kitchen, the shelving and doors below the counter top need to be removed. As much as is possible, the metal shelving around the kitchen sink needs to be disassembled and set aside. Once this is done, I will have full access to get the new plumbing installed.
