Along the tracks

2024 has arrived and the Riverside Live Steamers will be 58 years old this year!

As with all railroads, track maintenance is an important part of successful operations. RLS is no different. Without continuous maintenance and track renewal, our run days could become problematic.

December 16th workday saw the track crew installing a relay switch in the car lead to David's Yard. This switch installation will allow access to the east side of David's Yard. In addition, the west-side tracks will have a better alignment for access to the storage building.

Changing out all the switches in David's Yard will also provide longer switching leads for car access.

Our normal work continued in the compound on several projects and general clean up.

January 20, 2024, Workday Track Crew project will be alignment and leveling of the curve from Big Pine Tree to the Summit Siding Switch #2. This area has been reported in the OS reports as very rough. Additional ballast will also be spread in various areas along the mainline where the end of ties are now showing.

Chris Enright and family will be our chef providing the lunch for the workers at Noon in January. The board meeting will be held starting at 1 PM. Come out and enjoy your railroad.

Run Day December 24th

It was a fantastic experience to run Eastbound Figure-8 throughout Hunter Park on Christmas Eve during our very last Run Day of 2023. The early morning temperature began at 47° F with sunny and clear skies, but warmed up quickly to the mid 60s. All steam locomotives thrived in such irresistible conditions. An unusual feature of the day was the nearly-empty park. For the first time in years, engineers didn't have to dodge foul balls from the

softball fields, slow down for players kicking soccer balls onto the tracks, or watch for little ones piling rocks on the rails while their parents are sitting at the picnic shelters enjoying the party. All mainlines were clear of obstructions and as a result, all train crews seemed relaxed and at ease performing their duties.



Two passenger trains and two freight trains were in service throughout the day shift. The #573 2-6-0 was the first freight train off the steaming bay with Engineer Richard Miller at the throttle. His brakeman was Non-resident member Colby Hoskinson visiting from Utah (more on Colby in a moment). Sean Hagen and Richard Ronne (and Tiffany Love on 1 run) maneuvered the second eastbound train led by the #733 Consolidation. #5057 was not far behind with Hunter Engineer Jonathon Rhorbach on the throttle with one hand and the Hunter steam gauge in the other. His brakemen were Tom Crue and Nick Ellis. The 4th train in service was the 2-8-0 operated by Steve Borcher, conducted by Peggy Borcher, and supervised by Trainmaster Maggie from the palace car.



All 4 trains were on schedule with Station Master Glenn Maness supervising speed limits and departing trains from Hunter Station. Marty Berg flagged the public at the 4-track crossing as Tiffany Love gladly accepted cash donations for RLS Christmas swag from the merch cart. The OS was Chris Neiman.

Mike Harris and Tom Lebs provided valuable field support service on the mainline clearing tracks from overnight falling debris before and during rail operations in isolated locations. RLS CEO BROOK ADAMS actually broke a sweat tamping down ballast between the ties near the Casford X-ing while Bill Hesse inspected items related to the railroad's signals. SMP Horgan was present with Starbucks, coffee cake, and plenty of holiday cheer.



I want to thank Richard Miller, Steve and Peggy, Richard Ronne and Sean, and Jonathan for getting Colby onboard every train in operation today. I found that somewhat amusing since that's something I've never even done or heard of on a single day visit. Colby seemed to have had a great time train hopping with all of the train crews as well as speaking with other members working elsewhere. Hopefully, we'll see him in the near future for more coffee and doughnuts.

All in all, there were 19 members in attendance with 5 guests including Club Secretary Bob Robert's son and family. Rail operations concluded at 1:00 pm in time for Christmas Eve events. I wish you all a Merry Christmas and Happy New Year!
