The track project for November 18, 2023, workday will be the replacement of Columbia Yard Switch CY-6 with a new left hand steel frog switch. A big thanks to Richard Ronne, our master switch builder who completed this replacement switch in October.

This project is a continuation of our switch replacement program to install steel frog switches on all mainline switches removing aluminum frog units. The old switches have held up well with over 40+ years of service!

The relay switch will not go to waste as they are being used in yard service in the realignment of David's Yard for the installation of the third level lift.

Many other projects will be in progress on Saturday in the compound and out on the mainline. There are many opportunities for all members to participate in the workday efforts. Plan now to join us at the Railroad for another great workday at RLS.



From the Superintendent of Motive Power

Because things have quieted down a bit, or I'm being shamed as SMP, the Big Boy was hauled off the storage tracks and onto a steaming bay. The boiler was checked and passed with flying colors, which indicated that we could light a fire in the beast and see if that portion of it still worked. Before lighting the fire, we did a pretty through visual inspection of all the running gear and appliances for obvious defects. We did find one. Some flop eared gob of monkey spit felt that they needed the Superscale injector cap and cone/washer assembly more than RLS did.

The engine has sat quietly for a longer bit of time than it should have, however that does not justify the theft of any part. There is NO justification for the theft of anything attached to a steam engine, or any other item that doesn't belong to you. There is no way to know when the theft took place. The injector the parts were stolen from was on the aisle side of the parked engine and open access to anyone.

BABB'S BUILDING REPIPING AND CABINETS

Well, hello all Riverside Live Steamers and Friends,

Yep, you guessed it, it's me again! Please stop rolling your eyes!!! OK, here we go. After a nice April 9th run day, everything was great so we thought!!! There was trouble brewing, and hiding in our walls, ceilings, and behind the cabinets. I was doing some of treasurer's work at the club Tuesday after the run day and saw nothing different in the building. Everything seemed fine.

We got to the clubhouse on Saturday for the April 15th work day, and everything seemed normal. We went on doing projects around the clubhouse and railroad. I walked in and made a comment on how did the water get on the floor. Well, I guess you could imagine the looks we gave one another. At first, we thought, "Did someone drop something?" We started to look around, and the water seemed to be coming from behind the sink. So, we decided after enough board members were nearby that we would remove the backsplash top from behind the sink to see if we could find it. Hmmm!!! Don't see anything here!!! Then, Bob came in and I quote, "If you would have asked me, I would have told you that there is nothing back there to leak." Bob started to feel around the walls and felt that the first restroom wall was damp. You couldn't see anything, but it was damp. So, here we go again! We knocked a

hole in the wall to see the pipes. Hmmm!!! Nope! Not here but it is coming down the wall. Now that we know where the pipes are, we went to the ceiling and knocked another hole there this time. Bingo, don't you just love this JOB!!! There it is!!! So, we increased the size of the hole so we could get some buckets to catch the water.

All right, it is a Board Meeting Day. We, the Board decided to get prices to replumb the building. Our Compound Supervisor Bob Roberts was going to get us prices. After the meeting, I went to get something to BANDAID the pipe to hopefully stop the leak, which it did



Bob designed the new way to plumb the building and, of course, I through a couple of monkey wrenches in so we made some changes and moved forward. Bob got all the prices that he could think of that we might need at this time. Remember what I just wrote here. He presented to the B.O.D. at the next work day meeting on May 20th the costs of the replumbing. WOW, I never saw the B.O.D. make a decision so quick! It didn't take six months, three weeks, and five days to decide to do this. We decided to start the project after the last night run in August and allocated the money for it. Now it's up to me to budget this surprise. Things still not talked about are the cabinets and the walls that will have to be repaired or replaced.

Over the next few work days and meetings, the B.O.D. talked about the cabinets and walls with no real decision. Then, out of the woodwork, Bill said at a board meeting that he would donate the cabinets! I think you could have heard a pin drop!!!! Of course, Dave in his infinite wisdom and usual way I don't know the exact words he used, but it went something like this, "Oh MY GOD MAN you are a LIFESAVER!!!! (I think he was having OREO COOKIE withdrawals since I don't think we had any for the meeting, and all he could think of was LIFESAVERS at the moment.) Thanks for your donation." I think we all shook our heads and said thank you to Bill for his donation. Jennifer Kennedy, Bill's daughter, drew up a project outline with

cabinet numbers and locations so we could figure out what to get, and pretty much where they were going to be installed.

At the August 19th workday Chris Neiman, Bob, Bill, and myself started to tear out the cabinets. We got almost everything out except

for a few things that we couldn't shut the water off to because of stuck valves. We cut the walls open so Bob could get to the pipes.



On August 21st Bob shut off the water and it is now GAME ON!!! By the time I got there, Bob had already gotten the sink and the plumbing we couldn't disconnect out, and we were ready to cut and remove the old plumbing and that went pretty quick. The pipes were really getting bad. OK, remember earlier when I said Bob got prices on what we thought we would need? First bump... Bob took out the old hot water heater that we



thought would be fine to put back in. WRONG!!! It was so full of rust and calcium, probably rust from the pipes mainly and calcium of course from our water that we figured

that it should be replaced. Especially since after long discussions we decided to move the water heater to the corner in between the cabinets. UGH!!! Oh yeah, bump two... We moved the water heater. Bob planned on it staying where it was originally at. OOPS!! Not too big of a deal, just needed more parts for a location change. Bill asked if we knew anyone that could work and install the cabinets and, of course, I nominated my son Jonathan! I told Bill that Jonathan would be running the show and that we would do what he says we need to do when we need to do it. No exceptions!!! OK, I think we got that settled. I told Jonathan I nominated him for the job and, of course, I got that "But, but, but we have so many things we have to get done here." So, you all know the rest of that part of the story; he did it. After many discussions with Bob figuring things out and running damage and friction control that slowed us down a bit, we got the water back on in the compound for testing on August 29th, only missing one regular run day (You're welcome, John).

After testing the pipes for leaks, we were finally ready to start putting in the cabinets and start drywalling the restroom. Chris Neiman and Tom Crue cleaned and rebuilt the commodes, Bill started to prime and paint the walls, ceiling, and upper cabinets in the kitchen. Before the installation of the cabinets, Jonathan and I were working on making a removable access hole in the sink cabinet to get to the water heater in order to repair or remove when it becomes necessary, and to seal the back so bugs and mice can't get in. This has been a big part of this plan to seal the cabinets to keep critters out for a cleaner environment. After Bill primed the walls and ceiling, sometime late that evening/night something happened. Well, remember the story about the shoe cobbler? Well, it happened at R.L.S. Jonathan and I picked up another gallon of paint and put it on the table with all the rollers and extensions; we have no clue what happened after that. Hmmm!!! I got a call from Bill the next day, who painted the kitchen. It looks done. I just put one coat on and was tired and was going to finish it today. Like I told him about the cobbler... Don't question it!!!




Bob and I drywalled the restroom, Bill and I primed and painted, and Bob and I set the backsplash. Jonathan, Bill and I set the sink cabinet and then started around to the north wall. Of course, Dave, in his, you guessed it, infinite wisdom goes, "Can I make a suggestion? You need to put a door in the removable side so if we need to, we can shut off the water to the heater." I of course said, "Dave, just go shut the water off at the valve outside." Dave said, "Do you think someone will think of that if it happens? They're going to be running around here looking for a screwdriver to take the side off!" I said, "OK Dave you have a GOOD point!!!!" So, we removed the side panel and brought it back home to put in a sliding door. In the meantime, Jonathan and I were working on the base of the cabinets for the three that are at the front door. After setting all the cabinets, Jonathan figured out all the boards that we needed to seal the cabinets and spacers for

how it looks. On October 8th Dave took over O.S. duties for me so that Jonathan and I could put the fillers in. Bob cleaned and sealed the floor for the tiles. On October 11th Bob showed me how the tiles were to be done, and he set all the starter tiles in the kitchen and bathroom. I finished the kitchen,



and he did the bathroom so it went pretty quick.

Finally, we are getting close to the end, and it's time for the countertops. At the October work day B.O.D. meeting, I got the filler boards in for the top and we got down the tops from the storage building so we could start installing them on Sunday, October 15th. Jonathan and I set the under boards for the countertops and drilled access holes to get to the water heater if needed and bolts to tighten the cabinet seam. Bill helped us set the countertops after Jonathan and I cut them. They fit like a perfect fitting glove. We had to get a different sink than was planned because we couldn't get to our removable side panel, so Jonathan and I found one, and Bill picked it up for us. We screwed the countertops in, set the sink, and cut the butcher block top for the three cabinets when you first enter. Chris came over to help and see how it was going on Monday, October 16th.



Jonathan and I worked on the butcher block at the house getting it finished, stained, and sealed. I called Bill and Chris up to let them know we were planning on installing and sealing everything Wednesday evening October 19th. We got to the club, and I had to finish hooking up the sink drain and hoses. Bill had already put the handles on the doors and drawers. Jonathan arrived after work so we could install the top and seal around everything. After placing the top and setting it,

I got on it to hold it from moving. GREAT!! We are done and just have to seal it. WRONG!!! I didn't realize that although the sealer had dried to the touch, it wasn't hard yet so as I got off the top, I left knee prints in the top... Perfect blue jean stitching marks. UGH!!! So, we grabbed some soft cloths and starting rubbing them out. I think we got them all. That's why the sign was on the counter top. Jonathan finished sealing all around the top of the counters and down the sides. I had to run and pick up a few more parts needed to complete the install of the sink, while Chris and Bill were getting the cabinets stocked and ready for the Fall Meet.

We still have some things to finish like the second restroom, the wall between the restrooms and adjacent wall, and we still need to put rubber moulding around the walls and cabinets so when we mop it doesn't damage the wood. Outside, we need to cut the concrete and replace the rest of the water line to the building from the city to us and the compound. However, this is our next year's projects. I think it's looking great, and I think the members of the club really like how it is coming out.

I want to thank everyone who has helped and supported this project. I will be sending out tax deductible donation letters to everyone who has donated to this project, whether you donated money or materials. I'm trying to get them out by the middle of December 2023, if not sooner, so you should be seeing them. I have a lot of bills and paperwork to do to get all this figured out. One really good thing is that with the support I got we do look like we stayed on budget. I will know for sure later this month. Thank You Again!!! Please contact me if you don't see your donation receipt by mid-December.

Also, I want to give a special thanks to Brook Adams and Dave Bunts for helping me not explode or lose my head, and who gave me encouragement and suggestions during this sometimes-wild adventure!!!
